Worksheet 1

Analyzing continuity and change through history

Using the table below, record the elements which reveal continuity and change in order to trace the historical evolution of the Sandy Hill neighbourhood from the time of its creation in the 19th century.

Historical aspects	Elements of continuity (which remain stable)	Elements of change (that which has changed)
<p>Territory:</p> <p>Based on the University of Ottawa Master Plan, identify elements of continuity/change in local land use planning (geography/cartography, buildings, residences, parks/green spaces).</p>		
<p>Architecture:</p> <p>Using images from Laurier House, Sandy Hill and Google maps, identify elements of continuity/change in neighborhood architecture (house styles, building structure, appearance, embellishment, etc.).</p>		
<p>Population:</p> <p>Based on the text "Living in Sandy Hill," determine the elements of continuity/change in the different populations that inhabit the neighborhood (think in terms of socio-economics, culture, and language).</p> <p>Based on the excerpt from the <i>La Côte de Sable</i> novel, determine if people of this era represent social continuity or change in relation to the present day.</p>
